

### Presbytery of Greenock and Paisley FEB/MAR/APR

NOTICES: – GUEST SPEAKER – THE RIGHT REVEREND JOHN CHAMBERS, MODERATOR OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND. On his visit to our Presbytery Mr. chambers spoke about the challenges facing the church at this time and encouraged us to continue to work for the glory of God. He visited among others, Greenock Prison, Ferguson's Shipyard and Inverclyde Family Contact Centre. He also preached at the Greenock Wellpark Church.

COMMISSIONERS TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY 2015:- Rev. Karen Harbison and Mr. Alan Gallacher, Elder were nominated and appointed to attend.

BUSINESS COMMITTEE: - Rev. Dr. Ken Forrest was nominated as the next Moderator for the Presbytery of Greenock and Paisley from September 2015.

VACANCY PROCEDURE COMMITTEE: - Greenock Lyle Kirk was granted an extension of permission to call for a further 6 months.

COMMUNITY INTERESTS COMMITTEE: - The Counselling Service at the Wynd Centre Paisley provides confidential, professional counselling to those with family troubles, work relates stress, health issues or bereavement. There is a counselling manager and 35 counsellors who volunteer their services. The service depends on donations from users and grants from various organisations. We pray for the continued success of this service. The committee encourage us to read "The Lies we tell Ourselves: ending Comfortable myths about Poverty." A copy is available if wanted. It challenges prejudices and assumptions we all make.

ZIMBABWE:- A survey is being conducted to decide the future of the covenant both presbyteries have. Kirk Sessions are asked to give their views and decisions will be taken at June Presbytery.

MISSION AND DISCIPLESHIP: - The committee notes that for Pastoral care volunteers best practice would be that everyone visiting on behalf of the church should be a PVG member. It was agreed this is a very grey area and it was remitted back to the committee. Pray Across Scotland meeting will take place at Lyle Kirk, Union St Wed. 13<sup>th</sup> May at 7.30 p.m.

### Guild

Coming towards the end of our season we again had to call off our speaker Mr.N.McCarey because of the snow. Hopefully he will be able to come and speak about Norway next season.

We have had very interesting speakers some serious some with humour. Our ABM and Bring and Buy, the proceeds were sent to the W Evolution project in Greenock which is one of the National Guild projects, was very well attended. Mr. T. Ferdinand and Mr. Wm. It was gratifying to hear the esteem in which she is still held in Nigeria.

The Guild report at the General Assembly will be heard on Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup> May and the Action Plan looking to the future of the Guild will be presented.

The new National Convener and Vice-convener will take office for next year.

Attending these meetings is a privilege and an opportunity to learn more of the work of the Guild.

### Safeguarding of Children and Vulnerable Adults at Westburn

First of all, a huge thank you to Norman Paterson who has for many years looked after the Safeguarding of Children and Vulnerable Adults at Westburn. He is now taking a well-earned retirement and we wish him well. The new Safeguarding Coordinators are Jennifer Boag and Sheila Tait and we hope that we will be able to carry on Norman's good work.

Norman had completed the PVG (Protection of Vulnerable Groups) checking of all those who work with children and vulnerable adults in Westburn, well ahead of schedule, and we want to continue to ensure that all children and vulnerable adults in our congregation, our Youth Organisations or who visit us, are safe and secure.

For those of you in the congregation who don't know about Safeguarding, the church is required by law to ensure that all those volunteering to work with children and vulnerable adults have received a PVG check and no one is allowed to work with these groups until they have had such a check. Sadly, there are a few people who present a danger to children and vulnerable adults and we must ensure that these people do not work with them.

If you have not already done so, and you are one of the people who have received a PVG check, we would strongly encourage you to attend one of the Volunteer Training courses which are held throughout the year across Presbytery. If you haven't been to one recently, it is recommended that you attend a refresher course every five years. We plan to intimate these courses in the Order of Service when they are held locally and would like to be able to say that all the volunteers in Westburn have been trained.

We would also strongly encourage all Elders who have not yet attended the Elders' course to do so. The Kirk Session has a particular responsibility to ensure that our church meets its responsibilities in this area, and the training course helps elders to understand the issues and their responsibilities. Some Kirk Session have 100% of their elders trained, it would be good if Westburn could join that number.

If everyone involved in this area of work has been trained, then the church will be in a good position should there ever be any issues regarding the protection of children or vulnerable adults in our congregation.

We hope to visit all our youth organisations over the next few months to introduce ourselves and let everyone know that we are here to help. New posters will shortly be appearing in various halls and rooms where our organisations meet giving more information and our contact details. We will also be carrying out a health and safety check to ensure that all rooms in our buildings where children and vulnerable adults might have access are as safe as they can be.

# **39<sup>th</sup> Greenock Guides**


