Welcome to the Summer Magazine 2016


As you receive your magazine with your Elder's visit you may not be thinking yet about Summer, or maybe you are well organised with holidays booked and plans made.

#### From the Manse

Dear Friends,

Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup> April sees the arrival of this year's 'Blue Book' at my house – so thick, so many pages that it cannot be put through the letterbox. I imagine the post man was glad to get rid of that out of his bag. It is a big volume in more ways than one, for it contains the reports of all the councils and committees of the church, reports that reflect the life and work and worship and witness of the church at this time and which try to steer the church forward to engage with the challenges and possibilities of and for the church in the days ahead. These are the reports that will be debated and discussed at this year's General Assembly which begins on Sat 21<sup>st</sup> May. Some members of Westburn Parish Church will be there that day, supporting Rev. Russell Barr, who was minister of St Luke's for a while and well loved by many in Greenock.

I'm not a commissioner to this year's General Assembly and so the pressure to read the 'Blue Book' isn't so great as in other years but I always try to read a fair bit of it because it's important to keep up to date with current thinking and to understand at least something of the wide ranging work that our Church of Scotland is involved in.

This year's title for the 'Blue Book' and the theme for much of the work of the General Assembly and for the Heart and Soul Celebration is 'People of the Way'. The Report of the Mission and Discipleship Council introduces this theme "People of the Way serves as a clarion call for the Kirk to be in step with God's mission in the world" The church at all levels and we as the church in our time and place have to find ways of being in step with God's mission, with each person being enabled to use their gifts in that work. Our Kirk Session, in preparation for a visit from Presbytery's Local Church Review Team, has been doing some thinking about our priorities for the next few years. Each one of us is needed as we walk out in step with God's mission in our community.

This year's 'Pray Now' book also follows the same theme and includes the following prayer: -

"Guide me, so I may step boldly forward in faith and find all that you want me to discover today. Go beyond and behind, to my left and my right, that wherever way I seek to go, I will surely find You in everything and everyone I meet. Amen "

But just as importantly I have been getting to know people (although my dreadful memory for names sometimes lets me down), visiting in their homes, chatting over tea and coffee, assisting at Messy Church and Holiday Club, attending Guild meetings and so on. The more I learn about the great variety of work a minster undertakes the more I realise what a privilege it is to be able to take the time to be with, and walk beside, people, and that the 23 months will not be enough time to get to know everyone as well as I would like.

Karen, Stuart and so many others have been supportive and encouraging however I would encourage everyone to give more feedback as this allows both myself, and any future Candidates\Probationers, to reflect on their growth and development, for example: did something work well, what could be changed/improved, was something understandable or confusing.

Philippians 3:12 I don't mean to say I am perfect. I haven't learned all I should even yet, but I keep working toward that day when I will finally be all that Christ saved me for and wants me to be.

## **Property Committee**

As mentioned in the last magazine, there is water ingress in the roof and tower the north & west tower windows will be replaced / repaired in June 2016

In the high area of the tower, the top hatch has been replaced and an area of the wall requires to be treated for fungus. It is thought that this contamination has been caught before it has become serious.

This work has revealed that there is further water penetration in the spire south louvre. Steeplejacks have attended to investigate and a full report is awaited.

In the lower corridor - on the floor (at left hand window), wet rot has been discovered. This has been stripped off and repaired by volunteer labour.

In the centre rear stairway (on the landing floor outside Room No 1), the tiles have been removed due to dampness. Again, repair work is in hand by use of voluntary labour

With the intent of helping to contain heat in The Sanctuary, The Guild has agreed to fund the provision of heavy curtains for the three lower doors and two gallery doors. The curtains are in the process of being completed, again by voluntary labour.

A range of other minor issues have been identified and are being addressed

At The Manse, It is proposed to carry out redecoration of the hall (upper & lower).

In addition, there is a need to carry out roof repairs involving replacement of lead and pointing of stonework.

A range of minor work is continually ongoing. Volunteer labour contributes to a substantial cost saving in church expenditure. If any member would like to assist in any way, please contact Jim Bell (Tel No 799381)

Greenock Presbyterial Council has held its Spring Rally and Syllabus Planning meeting since the last magazine. At the Spring Rally our speaker Vicki McCarthy was unable to attend due to illness but we were fortunate that Ian Milne at short notice was able to come along. Our Syllabus Planning meeting gives all the local Guilds a chance to share ideas from the previous session to help arrange speakers and ideas for the forthcoming session. This year was different as we looked at the Future Plan for the Guild and also discussed what Guilds were looking for from the Council. Business Committee have been looking at ways we could take to encourage Guilds to come together oftener. To this end we have arranged to hold 4 "Tea & Chat" afternoons during the summer months. The idea is members of the local Guilds can drop in, enjoy a cup of tea and have a chat with friends. This venture will be reviewed after the summer break. The committee have also decided to hold 2 evening meetings and 2 afternoon meetings during the session, the evening meetings will be at the start before the nights get too dark for members to come out. The final meeting will be in the form of an entertainment evening.



#### **National Guild News**

I've attended several venues since the last time I reported in the magazine, a Roadshow in Motherwell, the Resource Co-ordinators meeting in Stirling which I found interesting (ideally I would like someone within the council to take on this task), I've also attended 2 Resource days (Glasgow & Ayr) these replace the former Theme & Topic Day. I've also been attending various meetings in Edinburgh on behalf of The Guild, nationally & locally. I stated in the last magazine the connection that has been forged with Malawi and the offering at the "Big Sing" in November 2015 was to go to Louden Training College in Embangweni to furnish the rooms in the hostel. At a recent National Executive meeting it was passed that the rooms would be named after people connected with the Guild including Archibald Charter who is the founder of the Guild. If any more money is raised from events it will be used to further the connection of The Guild with Malawi.

The Guild Annual report will be given at the General Assembly on Tuesday 24 May probably in the afternoon. It has been agreed that there will be a "Big Sing" in Edinburgh during the General Assembly on that evening, this will be streamed. Our church is to be the venue for anyone wanting to share in this event on the evening at 7pm. This is not just for Guild members, if you enjoy a sing please feel free to come along. Unfortunately the Moderator designate, Rev Dr Russell Barr will not be attending as he & Margaret are to have dinner at the Palace of Holyrood that evening. This event has been well supported and at present there are 130 on a waiting list. Once again the offering at this event will be going to the Lounden Training College.

I'm delighted to say that the next "Big Sing" during Guild Week in November is coming to Westburn Parish Church it was decided that it should come to the west coast and I suggested, with the Kirk Session's approval, that our church was suitable as it could accommodate around 1100 people. So let's hope we have a good turnout and have an enjoyable sing.

Before The Guild event at the General Assembly, I'll be attending the meetings in Edinburgh including the Project Co-ordinators Meeting where those attending will receive the latest news on all the projects.

Also on Saturday 30<sup>th</sup> April I'll be in Kelso for the Borders Gathering, the idea behind this event is to enable those who cannot for many reasons attend the Annual Gathering in Dundee a chance to participate in something similar in their own region.

As well as that taking place the Guild organisation, due to the Action Plan that was set up, have decided to make alterations to the national format. In future the National Executive will be known as the National Council. It was felt that this would fit in better from the grass roots as we start with the Guild—Presbyterial Council—National Council. The 4 committees are being renamed - Events, Communications and Marketing, Resources and Outreach. So as this session comes to a close the Guild nationally are moving forward under the strategy "Be bold, be strong" in faith.

Please thank the congregation for the generous donation that they gave to the school. It could not have come at a better time as the school water pump broke and we have to get it repaired and clean out the huge water tank. We will also be able to service the school car which is long overdue, and paint the classrooms as they are dirty and grimy. Luckily most of the labor will be done by the older children from the support group who are only too happy to "give back" to Vhutshilo.

At present we have 73 babies, toddlers and pre-schoolers. My one teacher resigned with no notice, which was a huge disappointment as we had trained her up over the past 4 years. I do understand though, as she was offered employment with a much higher salary than we can afford. My other teacher was ill for a while, so it was more chaotic than usual as my gardeners and cooking staff had to take turns to supervise the youngsters while we advertised and interviewed for a new teacher. Thank goodness we are back on track and the children are once again having proper classes.

As usual I am at a loss to express my gratitude for your kindness and ongoing support.


## **Cruise Ships**

## **Worship Group**






