NEWSLETTER - May 2010

My time with you is running out – fast! Come the end of June I will make way for the return of the Very Rev William Hewitt and head once again into fulltime retirement. I hope you feel that my time with you has been well spent. I have certainly derived a great deal of satisfaction as I have sought to minister to the best of my ability to the needs of the congregation and parish.

Laura and I have felt very much at home in your company and we take away with us many good memories of the Westburn family. You have made our task easy and rewarding in the ways in which you welcomed and accepted us in the roles normally occupied by Bill and Moira.

I was pleased in the first instance to be invited by Bill to act as Locum and Interim Moderator for the duration of his moderatorial year. In prospect, it was a daunting challenge; but with the encouragement and support of the regular worshipping congregation and a first-rate leadership team my concerns soon evaporated.

At the outset I was eased in gently thanks to shared ministry and the good company of the Rev Douglas Hamilton. His departure almost a year ago meant that I had become "the responsible person". I was given my place as minister of Westburn without question, and I am grateful for the trust placed in me at that time.

There have been several highlights during my time, but the one that stands out was the visit of Wahvoo and Suzi. What an exceptional child Wahvoo is! To come among total strangers, and into a very different culture, and telling us so openly about her HIV/Aids condition was remarkable. And it is wonderful that even now when she is facing operations to improve her hearing that we have been able to help. The congregation and other friends have responded magnificently.

Another highlight has been my association as chaplain with Ardgowan Primary School. I have enjoyed particularly my visits to the various classes and have come across many bright, thought provoking young people, and I wonder why so few find their way into the Church, though that is a challenge that has exercised many in the Church. My time at Greenock Academy has been less satisfying. I discovered very quickly that it is hard to get behind the facade of those who are emerging into adulthood, and that I have little in common with the third year group with whom I have been associated. However, the social side of Academy life has more than counterbalanced my feelings of inadequacy.

Also on the outside, I have been welcomed into the company of neighbouring ministers in the West End, and have discussed with them the challenges of bringing the congregations together following the departure of two colleagues. I share their frustration that the Presbytery has not initiated a process that will take forward the projected union of the "other" congregations.

On my last Sunday, 27 June, I will record my indebtedness to those who are in the forefront of leadership within the congregation. You have a very committed and capable team and it has been an undoubted pleasure working with them. As I bid you farewell, I will also record my indebtedness to you and to those who have welcomed me into their homes. I have shared the joys of congregational life in the Baptism of several infants, in welcoming three new members by profession of faith, and in solemnising one marriage. I have also shared in the sadness of many families in the congregation and the wider parish.

It has been a privilege and a pleasure to have belonged for a time to the Westburn family and I will remember you in my prayers as you continue to proclaim the Gospel of God's love in word and action. I am also pleased to welcome Bill and Moira home after an eventful and unforgettable year in the service of the national Church, and I hope and pray they will soon settle once again to parish life.

This letter tells you about your congregation's Ministries and Mission Contribution - the money your Congregational Treasurer sends to the Church Offices in Edinburgh. How does it enable the worship, mission and service of the Church?

The information below shows how your congregation's contribution is used to support Parish Ministries, Mission and Renewal, and general support and services provided for congregations and the councils of the General Assembly. Please note that the cost of your minister is not what he/she is paid. This cost is the total for stipend and employer's national insurance and pension contributions, and is based on a minister with ten years' service.

Letter from Suzie

Dear Rev Bill and members of the congregation.

I am at a loss for the appropriate words to thank you all for the amazing amount of money that you donated for Wavho's ear operations. When she adopted me at the tender age of two and a half years, I made a pact to give her all the love, the best education and the best medical care I could possibly afford. Thank you for helping me to fulfil the most difficult part of this promise.

My daughter sailed through the first operation, which was made possible by donations from friends, both local and abroad. She astounded the hospital staff and the surgeon with her bravery, bright smile and concern about the other children in her ward. They were also all amazed at her openness regarding her HIV status, and her ward became quite busy as staff and patients came to see and talk to her. Although tired and in some pain, my child smiled and answered questions, and I wanted to burst with pride for this child that I have been blessed with.

The good news is that the 3 small bones in the inner ear had not been affected, which had been our major worry. Last week we went back to the doctor so he could drain the ear, and on a T.V. screen we could see the new eardrum instead of the big gaping hole that he had shown us previously. In 6 weeks time we have to go back to the audiologist to check her hearing levels. He is hopeful we will achieve at least 85% hearing in this ear...

I was hoping to have the first operation on the other ear done in the June/July school holidays but the doctor says this can only be done nearer the end of the year. As this is the worse ear (she only has 22% hearing) it will require 2 operations to replace the eardrum. The money you have all donated will be put into an investment account so we can benefit from the better interest rate. As none of you have probably experienced the services (or lack thereof !!) offered by our local government hospitals, you have no idea what it means for me to be able to admit my child to this great private hospital where she is treated in a clean and sterile environment, and with staff that are compassionate, competent and efficient.

From the bottom of my heart I thank you all.

And after draining it I will be very happy because I will be able to swimm and I will be doing better at school. I will not worri about the other operations becos i now it does not hurt to much.

And I am very happy that I am going back to school on monday. Please tell everyone ndo livhuwa (thank you)
