These five marks of mission are helping to guide us all through the Presbytery Mission Planning Process as we think about how as a congregation and we together with other we congregations in Inverclyde live out the gospel in our time and place. Across the whole of the Church of Scotland Presbyteries have been instructed to develop plans for the next five years, plans which have mission at their heart and which at the same time fit with the reducing number of ministries, both Ministers of Word and Sacrament and Ministry Development staff we have, and with the buildings which are in the right places and well equipped places for the worship and life of our congregations and our service to and partnerships with our communities. Our Kirk Session and congregation have already been involved in discussions, conferences and conversations in recent months and this will continue in days to come as Clyde Presbytery tries to bring a Mission Plan together by the end of this year, as instructed by the General Assembly. This is a challenging process with many different layers involved and factors to be taken into account. In our own local area, the consultation document indicates that there will be 6 ministries to cover from Port Glasgow to Skelmorlie. The process will mean changes for all of us, changes to the way we are together as church and our links with other congregations. Let us be ready to work together for God's kingdom so that God's love may be known and shared.

The Annual Gathering of the Guild will have taken place in Edinburgh on Saturday 10th September, when the new National Convener (NC) Helen Eckford will be installed (different from when I was NC). Helen is a member of New Parish Church, Port Glasgow. The retiring NC's Challenge was a traybake which was judged on the day of the Annual Gathering, I'm pleased to tell you that Senga Currie's, a member of our Guild, traybake was chosen to represent Inverclyde Guilds Together (IGT). The following day sees the start of Guild Week, we were given suggestions how we could celebrate the week. Update from Venda

Khathu started her update by thanking everyone for their continued support.

The 3rd term of the year started on 19th July. The school was relieved that the previous ruling for mandatory mask wearing has now been lifted. I am sure, especially for the younger children, that this will make life a lot easier.

At present, the school role stands at 81 students. 51 of these are children are HIV/AIDS positive (15 are from a local orphanage and have been abandoned by their parent) The remaining 30 children are from middle income families.

The children are divided into 3 groups. 1-2 years, 3-4 years and aged 5 pupils.

The school also continues to try and support the local community, by providing clean water from their supply and vegetables from their community garden.

Some members of the local community also volunteer in the garden and in return receive a healthy meal when they are there.

They raised over £1000 and have been in discussion with Khathu on how this amazing amount of money will be spent at Vhutshilo. It has been decided the money will be used to provide a septic tank & drainage for the new toilet block and the remainder to replace the wire fence round the school which is the original when the school was built 2005.

A huge thank you goes to Stuart and Patricia for their kindness and to everyone from Westburn for their ongoing support.

Report on 2022 General Assembly

It was my privilege to be a Commissioner to this year's Church of Scotland General Assembly in Edinburgh in May. This was a busy Assembly which took many important decisions. The Assembly was a hybrid one this year with about two thirds of Commissioners in the Assembly Hall in Edinburgh and the rest online in their homes.

The Assembly began on Saturday morning with the usual ceremonial and the installation of Rev Ian Greenshields as the new Moderator. We had an interesting speech from the retiring Moderator, Lord Wallace, who brought something new to the position with his many contacts through his previous roles in politics. The Queen's representative, the Lord High Commissioner, was Lord Hodge.

A new Principal Clark Rev Fiona Smith, the first woman in the position, was appointed.

We then moved on to business with the Reports of the Assembly Business Committee and the Assembly Trustees. There were proposals to look at changes to the operation of the Assembly and there was a debate on whether the ceremonial aspects of the Assembly should be reviewed with some arguing that these were outdated and gave the wrong message about the Church.

Sunday's business consisted of the main service in St Giles' on Sunday.

Monday morning began with Assembly Communion. The singing as always was wonderful. We were then treated to a short speech by Professor Jason Leitch who was a guest at the Assembly and commended the Church for its reaction to the pandemic.

We moved on to the Report on Returns to Overtures which covered the most controversial item of business. Presbyteries had approved by over 2:1 allowing ministers to solemnise same sex marriages, and this required the final approval of General Assembly. There were several speakers both for and against, and although there were strong feelings, the debate was measured. As you are probably aware, this was passed by a good majority.

The afternoon session began with the Ecumenical Relations Committee Report, and we had contributions from several of our guests from other churches. The previous Moderator, Lord Wallace, had signed what we agreed to call the St Margaret Declaration of friendship with the Roman Catholic Church, and we welcomed Archbishop Leo Cushley to speak to us. On St Andrew's day on 2021, Lord Wallace had also signed the St Andrew's Declaration with the Scottish Episcopal Church.

Tuesday began with the Assembly Trustees presentation of a number of videos of faith in action across Scotland.

This was the day on which the two new Forums – Faith Nurture and Faith Impact - presented their reports. Faith Nurture deals with the organisation of the Church.

The Faith Impact report was very wide-ranging dealing with important issues such as climate change. We called for a windfall tax on oil and gas companies which was very much in the news at the time. The report also looked at work with refugees, and an end to conversion therapy. There was a supplementary report of the situation in Ukraine.

In the evening, I attended the Guild Big Sing where we heard first hand reports from Rt Rev Susan Brown who had recently visited Ukraine.

Wednesday was Chaplains' Day which is always an interesting occasion as we consider the work which Chaplains do on behalf of the Church, especially those in the armed forces. Several other reports were discussed including from the Guild, Safeguarding and Social Care which covers the work of CrossReach. This shows some of the breadth of the work of the Church which we don't always see.

Thursday was the final day of the Assembly. The highlight was a speech from Archbishop John Sentamu who is now head of Christian Aid. Of particular interest to us in Greenock:Westburn was the Report of Deceased Ministers, Missionaries and Deacons when Lord Wallace read out the name of our former minister Rev Douglas Hamilton.

The Assembly concluded with worship as we all went back to our congregations to carry on the work of the Church.
